- Summarize a short text in three to five sentences with minimal prompting.

## Math Problem Solving

**Goal:** Student(s) will solve grade-level math word problems involving addition and subtraction.

**Objectives:**

- Represent word problems using drawings or equations with 90 percent accuracy.
- Solve single-step addition or subtraction problems with 80 percent accuracy.
- Explain the steps used to solve a problem in writing or verbally with three out of four correct explanations.

**Goal:** Student(s) will write structured paragraphs with a clear topic sentence and supporting details.

**Objectives:**

- Write a paragraph with at least three sentences related to a given topic.
