Piagetian theory was once considered able to describe the structure and development of human thought. As a result it generated an enthusiasm that it could direct education to develop new teaching methods particularly in science and mathematics. However, disillusionment with Piagetian theory came rather quickly because many of its structural and developmental assumptions appeared incongruent with empirical evidence. In recent years several neo-Piagetian theories have been proposed which try to preserve the strengths of Piaget's theory while eliminating its weaknesses. At the same time several other models have been advanced originating from different epistemological traditions such as cognitive differential psychology or socio-historical approaches. Originally published in 1992, this title was unique in representing most of these theories and traditions. Specifically, the authors focus their work on the educational implications of their research. The chapters are organized in three parts: the first part presents some widely known models of cognitive development and discusses their implications for different aspects of education; the second part is devoted to learning and cognitive acceleration; while part three highlights teaching methods that would improve the acquisition of particular skills in specific areas. Written by an eminent group of truly international contributors, this title will still be useful to students and researchers in cognitive development and education as well as educational policy makers.

**Lesson Study Research and Practice in Mathematics Education** Lynn C. Hart, Alice S. Alston, Aki Murata, 2011-01-11 Lesson study is a professional development process that teachers engage in to systematically examine their practice with the goal of becoming more effective. Originating in Japan, lesson study has gained significant momentum in the mathematics education community in recent years. As a process for professional development, lesson study became highly visible when it was proposed as a means of supporting the common practice of promoting better teaching by disseminating documents like standards, benchmarks, and nationally validated curricula. While the body of knowledge about lesson study is growing, it remains somewhat elusive and composed of discrete research endeavors. As a new research area, there is no coherent knowledge base yet. This book will contribute to the field by bringing the work of researchers and practitioners together to create a resource for extant work. This book describes several aspects of Lesson Study; amongst others, it gives an historical overview of the concept, it addresses issues related to learning and teaching mathematics, it looks at the role of the teacher in the process. The last two sections of the book look at how Lesson Study can be used with preservice mathematics teachers and at university mathematics methods teaching.

provide clear learning expectations of mathematics content that are appropriate at every grade level and to help prepare all students to be ready for college and the workplace A quick glance at the Table of Contents in this book indicates a serious engagement with the recommended mathematics underlying the kindergarten through grade 5 portions of the CCSSM first with issues in content practice assessment learning teaching and classroom management pursued next and in that order In this book we explore what it means to teach to the CCSSM within an alignment mindset involving content practice learning teaching and assessment The CCSSM content standards which pertain to mathematical knowledge skills and applications have been carefully crafted so that they are teachable learnable coherent fewer clearer and higher The practice standards which refer to institutionally valued mathematical actions processes and habits have been conceptualized in ways that will hopefully encourage all elementary students to engage with the content standards more deeply than merely acquiring mathematical knowledge by rote and imitation Thus in the CCSSM proficiency in content alone is not sufficient and so does practice without content which is limited Content and practice are both equally important and thus must come together in teaching learning and assessment in order to support authentic mathematical understanding This blended multisourced text is a getting smart book It helps elementary majors and preservice beginning elementary teachers work within the realities of accountable pedagogy and develop a proactive disposition that is capable of supporting all elementary students in order for them to experience growth in mathematical understanding necessary for middle school and beyond including future careers
